A LETTER FROM PASTOR MIKE



The Gospel of John paints a compelling picture of the Lord Jesus Christ. At times, it is the simplest Gospel, perfect for both the new believer and the one who has an interest in knowing more about Jesus. At other times, it is an ocean where no believer can fully plumb the depths of its riches. Its author, John the Apostle, organized the book around seven signs, written so that “you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His Name (John 20:31).” Jesus wants you to experience the abundant life and the Gospel of John tells us how.

In addition to the seven miracles, John recorded seven “I AM” statements, spoken by Jesus, in order to give us a fascinating picture of our Lord. Incidentally, the number seven in Scripture often represents *completion*. When you contemplate Jesus’ revelation about Himself in John, you will gain a clear picture of our Lord and Savior.

The seven “I AM” statements are the focus of our new sermon series: *Knowing Jesus*. Your church staff believes that these uncertain days are the perfect time and opportunity for you to grow together as a family. As a result, we have compiled these devotions, prayers, and questions for the purpose of helping you achieve a deeper understanding of some of Jesus’ most famous statements in the New Testament. Our hope is that you will gather as a family or small group around the Word of God and explore the majesty and glory of Jesus Christ.

During this time, we are available to be contacted for questions, and we encourage you to do so as often as you need! May God bless your family as you pursue a deeper and more intimate knowledge of Jesus. I love being your pastor!

OUR HOPE

This guide is written to help you apply the Bible to your own life. It is not meant to replace or summarize scripture. Rather, we hope you will use it to accompany your Bible study.

As you read through the Gospel of John and consider the points and questions included here, we believe the Holy spirit will help you discover deeper truths, and perhaps understand familiar truths in a new light.

God's Word is alive. As you engage it, He will speak to you through it.

OUR APPROACH

This guide uses a Bible study structure based on the "SOAP" acronym: Scripture, Observation, Application, and Prayer. This is not the only method, just the one we happen to use here.

We have divided the guide into seven sections with the goal to accomplish one "I AM" statement a week. Each section is further divided into several parts. These do not correspond to days, so go through them at a pace that works for you.

This guide is primarily intended for personal study. Many of the questions prompt you to consider things from your own perspective, and some of your thoughts may naturally be private. After all, our hope is God uses this resource alongside His Word to speak to YOU.

Of course, you may find certain sections helpful for discussion with others, such as with your family or your small group. We encourage you to use this guide as you feel led.



Scripture

First, read the Scripture passage. Then read it again, using different translations, if possible. Resources like the **Bible App** and **biblegateway.com** allow you to access other translations for free and even read different translations side-by-side. It can also be helpful to break the passage down into a reading plan of smaller sections to study throughout the week.



Observation

Spend some time considering what you just read. It is important to carve out some intentional time for this study, so you are not tempted to rush. Write your thoughts in the spaces provided and have a notebook handy if you find yourself writing more. There are no right or wrong thoughts, only your own observations. We have included some additional thoughts on the passage to help. Study Bibles like the **English Standard Version (ESV) Study Bible** are also great resources for helpful notes, context, and explanations.



Application

Work through the questions that follow and be honest with yourself. This guide is a resource for you alone, which is why we recommend it for personal study. Writing out your answers can help you further process what you read. Don't limit yourself to these questions. God may prompt you to consider deeper questions.



Prayer

Spend some time talking and listening to God. Pray for God to help you better understand what He is trying to tell you in the passage and how he wants you to apply it. You will find some initial written prayers to help. We encourage you to even write out your own prayers, perhaps in a prayer journal.

READING PLAN

Reading the Bible is the best way to get to know God. After all, the Bible is His Word to us. The Holy Spirit will guide you and teach you as you read and pray. One great way to approach every section is to read the entire portion of the scripture each day of the workday week (Monday through Friday.) But each day, read a different translation or paraphrase of that same section. For example, you might consider a weekly plan that looks like this:

Monday: **English Standard Version (ESV)**
Tuesday: **New International Version (NIV)**
Wednesday: **Christian Standard Bible (CSB)**
Thursday: **New Living Translation (NLT)**
Friday: **New American Standard Bible (NASB)**

All of these translations are available in the **Bible App** by **YouVersion**. By reading each translation or paraphrase, you will notice details or nuances you might miss otherwise.

Another way to approach each section is to read bite-sized passages. By doing this you are afforded a great opportunity for deeper “meditation”. For example, a reading of Section 2 might look something like this:

Monday: **6:35-38**
Tuesday: **6:39-40**
Wednesday: **6:41-44**
Thursday: **6:45-47**
Friday: **6:48-51**

What is MEDITATION?

Quiet time to focus on a verse or small section of scripture and ask and listen for the Holy Spirit to reveal something new about it.

We have included a plan just like this for each section to help guide your study of scripture and meditation each week.

Remember, the goal is always life transformation; not simply more head knowledge.

Your knowledge will increase, but increased knowledge is not enough. The goal is to grow in your relationship with God as you learn more about Him. If you miss a day (or two, or three...) don't give up! Read again. Don't make the mistake of thinking your relationship with God depends on your perfection. Jesus achieved perfection for you. Spouses, siblings, and friends don't achieve perfection in their relationship. All they (and we) can do is keep relating. The same is true for a walk with God.

I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE

Observation

“Jesus said, I am the resurrection and the life.” You have probably heard that at a funeral. This is a true statement that brings comfort at a time of grief and loss. Jesus said this to Martha as she was mourning the death of her beloved brother, Lazarus. Jesus told her Lazarus would rise again. She had no problem believing he would rise again in the resurrection on the last day. To this Jesus told her, “I am the resurrection and the life.” He went on to say, “whoever believes in me will live, even though he dies.”

As believers in Christ we know that we will live for eternity, even after our earthly bodies die. One way of thinking about this is “eternal life begins here.” It was the great purpose of the life, death and resurrection of Christ to give this eternal life to all believers. He came into the world on purpose so that we should live forever through him. Does this impact the way we live every day? Does it affect the way we face death? When Jesus told Nicodemus that he must be born again (John 3:3), He was talking about a new way to live. But how can someone completely change the way they live? The answer is, with God all things are possible. Paul declared that if anyone is in Christ, they are new creations (2 Corinthians 5:17). Jesus is the way to this new life (John 14:6). When Christ asked Martha, “Do you believe this?” (John 11:26). Her answer was, “Yes, I believe.”

LAZARUS HAD BEEN DEAD FOR 4 DAYS...

In Jewish tradition, the soul of the deceased would linger around its body for three days, just in case it was able to return. When the body began to decompose on the 4th day, the soul would move on because at that point, death was considered to be irreversible.



Application

1) How is your life different now that you are a new creation?

2) How has faith in Jesus helped you when you have experienced a loss?

3) If Jesus Christ is your life, how will you live for Him today?



Prayer

“Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of eternal life. Today is the right now that you have given me. I submit you and your kingdom purposes. I pray for your will to be done in your way and in your time. I know whatever happens today that I am safe in your presence – help me not to forget this. If I face problems or hardships, help me not to worry or be frustrated, but help me relax in the peace you give me. Help me love others as you love me. To you be the glory and honor and power forever. AMEN.”

Observation

What immediately stands out to you?

Does it bring you comfort to know that Jesus has the power to take care of you? It can be easy for us to take on the wrong mindset for how our faith works - where we feel like it is our responsibility to earn our place at the table through our actions, hard work, and good natures. How great is it to know that this isn't the way our relationship with Jesus operates? Instead of telling his disciples to "go and earn their bread," he tells them, "I AM the bread." Shortly before he spoke those words, Jesus performed an incredible miracle by feeding over 5,000 people with just five loaves of bread and two fish. The most incredible part about this story isn't the miracle, but the fact that despite witnessing this, the people were still unable to believe that Jesus was exactly who he said he was.

ABOUT 5,000 MEN WERE THERE....

This miracle is recorded in all four Gospels, but only in the book of Matthew 14:21 are we given one more delicious detail:

"The number of those who ate was about 5,000 men, besides women and children."

Only the men were counted, but if they had counted the women and children, it is possible that Jesus fed over 10,000 people with five loaves and two fish.

Their disbelief reveals the true source of their starvation; not in their physical body, but their spiritual one. Meeting our physical needs are important; however, no matter how good we are physically, we will never be able to sustain spiritual healthiness through our own actions. This can only come through a relationship with Jesus Christ, the bread of life. In him, our needs are met. In him, we will not be left to be hungry or thirsty. Through his unfailing love and grace, we will be sustained.

Recall the words of Christ in John 6:35, *"He who comes to me will never go hungry, and he who believes in me will never be thirsty."* Are you living by the bread of life? Are you seeking Christ daily and desiring to know him more? Spend time this week counting the ways he has sustained your life so far and give thanks for all he has done.



Application

1) What does being sustained by Jesus look like according to this passage?

2) What is the significance of Jesus mentioning the manna in verse 49?

3) What are three practical steps we can take each to rely more on Jesus?



Prayer

“Lord, you are the bread of life. In you, I never have to fear that my needs will not be met. You have promised us that you would be faithful to sustain us by your will and by your grace, and you have never broken a promise. Develop in us the fruit of faithfulness, that we may know and believe that you are exactly who you say you are and give us the courage to be obedient to your Word. To you be the glory, forever and ever. AMEN.”

Jesus is the revelation of light. In the Old Testament when Israel was trudging through the wilderness, they were guided by a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. At one of the feasts in Jerusalem

LIGHT | PHOS, grk.

The light; anything emitting light; brightness.

Jesus stood up and proclaimed, "I am the light of the world." In other words, I am the God of the Old Testament who guided your forefathers. When you

think of Jesus as the revelation of light you have to think of purity. There is nothing as pure as sunlight. Light cannot be defiled. You can defile water or milk or bread or air, but light cannot be defiled or contaminated. Light exposes defilement and corruption but it is never itself defiled or contaminated. Light is pure. Jesus is the light. He is pure. Someone has well said, "Jesus was exposed to sin but never contaminated by it. He touched sinners but sin never touched Him."

As a matter of fact, the Bible says in Hebrews 4:15 (NIV), "*For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are -yet was without sin.*" Jesus Christ was and is undefiled purity and majesty, the light of the world.

When you think of Jesus as the light you must also think of power. Light is extremely powerful. Look at John 1:5. When the light shines in the darkness, the darkness cannot overcome it or extinguish it. Light always wins out over darkness. In fact, it's no contest. When you walk into a dark room you merely have to turn on the light and the light wins out. Darkness cannot win over light. When you bring light into darkness, darkness flees at the speed of light - 186,000 miles per second. When you think of Jesus as the light of the world you think of purity and you think of power. Is the light of the world shining in you?



Application

1) How can the light of the world come into your life?

2) What would your life look like if the light of Jesus was shining through?

3) Think of one thing you can do each day to demonstrate Jesus in your life.



Prayer

“Lord Jesus, help me to let my light shine. I know that many people in the world around me are in spiritual darkness. Will you help me to show them your beauty and perfection? I want my words, my attitude, and my actions to reflect your power and your grace. Jesus, shine through me so people will glorify my Heavenly Father. AMEN.”

Observation

The Word of God tells us that there are special people. A people who were chosen by God out of the world before the stars began to shine (Ephesians 1:4). A people who were redeemed by the precious blood of Jesus (1 Peter 2:24). The flock of His pasture, the sheep of His hand (Psalm 100:3). The common name in the New Testament for these people is *the church*.

Now, the all-important question is, how does someone become part of the church? Jesus Christ answers this by stating that He is the door by which all must enter. We walk through this door by simple faith; a faith that is genuine. One of the signs of authentic faith is obedience. It is necessary that the person who professes Christ as their Lord become like Him. Real faith never kicks at this rule, but rather finds joy in it. Jesus himself said, "If you love me, keep my commandments." This is why daily reading of the Bible is of utmost importance. We learn His commandments and how we are to live. Our motivation to do this comes from our love for Him.

Anyone that enters in by the door will be saved. Noah's ark was built in the olden times to preserve Noah and his family from the great flood. It could not be said that Noah was saved till he had passed through the door, but when he had done that, a divine hand shut the door. As Noah heard the door fasten, he understood that the Lord had shut him in, and he felt safe. To have faith in Christ is to have entered by the door. It is to depend upon Jesus, to give yourselves Him, and to rest on Him.

CHURCH | *Ekklesia, grk.*

The whole body of Christians scattered throughout the earth.

Observation

What immediately stands out to you?

One of my favorite parables in Scripture is the Parable of the Good Shepherd in John 10. In this passage, Jesus reveals that He is the Good Shepherd and states: “the Good Shepherd lays down His life for the sheep.” This is the awesome promise and plan of God: “To rescue His people from their sin.” Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and He laid down his life for His sheep on the cross. Jesus continues to tell us He is will rule reign, that He is like no other religious leader, that He has come with intent to die, and that His death will be for the rescue of His sheep and will be according to the will of the Father. He is not like a hired hand who has no real concern for the sheep and runs away at the sight of the wolf. He is good, and He knows His own sheep and they know Him. As the Good Shepherd, Jesus tells the crowd He has sheep in other folds that He must bring also (verse 16), referring to those outside of the Jewish culture. What a joy for us as Gentiles to hear that we are to be included in God’s plan of redemption! Hear His voice today! He is the Good Shepherd that lays down His life for the Jew and Gentile alike! Those who hear His voice will forever sing the praises of their Redeemer.

Jesus is often depicted in art as a gentle shepherd that is holding a lamb, and Scripture illustrates this well; however, we should never forget that He has a rod; an instrument used to symbolize the authority of the shepherd over the sheep. At the end of this parable, Jesus reminds us of His authority over all life and death. He reveals that no one can take His life from Him but that He lays His life down on His own initiative. He concludes with, “I have authority to lay it down, and I have authority to take it up again. This commandment I received from my father.” The power and authority of the Good Shepherd is as comforting to me as the gentle embrace of His arm!



Application

1) How are you comforted by both the mercy of God and the authority of God?

2) What are some ways that you can listen more closely for the Shepherd's voice?

3) What areas of your life do you need to surrender to His authority?



Prayer

"Lord, you are my Good Shepherd and your authority and mercy are amazing. You are worthy of all praise! I am thankful that you know me, and you love me, but most of all, I am thankful you laid down your life for me! You are forever faithful to guide me, and you will never leave me. Lead me to be obedient and truth you more and more each day. AMEN."

There are so many astounding, hope filled things in this word from the Lord. When Jesus spoke these words, He was conversing with His disciples at the Last Supper. He tells them in verse 1, "Do not let your hearts be troubled; believe in God, believe also in Me." And then in verse 2 he says, "In My Father's house are many dwelling places; if it were not so I

Jesus gives us three awesome truth statements about who He is in this passage. Not only is He the Way, but also the Truth, and the Life! In Jesus we find our direction, as well as assurance of who He is, and resurrection by His grace.

would have told you; for I go to prepare a place for you." In this same conversation, Jesus tells His disciples that He will come again and receive them, ending verse 4 with, "And you know the way where I am going." This leads to the question being asked by Thomas: "Lord we do not know where you are going, how do we know the way?" And Jesus replied, "I AM the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father except through Me."

It is astounding to me that the Holy God of creation would make a way for poor sinners like me to be received by Him. Jesus made it clear, no one can come to the Father unless they come through Him. All of us have sinned, but yet while we were sinners, Christ died for us! In our sin, our broken minds and depraved hearts cannot even understand the righteous Law of God and that we cannot know the truth on our own. In our sin, we are tossed about from one lie to another, trying to justify our actions, as we run away from the absolute authority and truth of God. But Christ did not leave us dead in our transgressions and forever bound by our waywardness! The standard of God's law, the Perfect truth of His Word, became flesh and dwelt among us. In knowing Jesus and following Jesus, we are no longer imprisoned by the lies of the enemy. Instead, Jesus is the very truth that is our foundation, the only One who could and did purchase our salvation!

To know that Jesus is the way to the Father, and the perfect truth who purchased our pardon is mind blowing enough but then to hear Him remind us that He is the life makes my hope in Him complete!



Application

1) Why is it significant that Jesus reveals this I AM statement at the Last Supper?

2) In what ways do we see that Jesus has set us free from John 14:6?

Jesus having all authority over life, purchased my eternal life when He walked out of that grave! Not only did Jesus stomp out my death and punishment but also provided abundant life in him both now and eternally.



Prayer

“Jesus, you are the way, the truth, and the life. I am truly set free from sin and the punishment of sin for all eternity because my hope and faith are in you alone. Thank you for your faithfulness to me and your love for me before I even knew you. Help me to follow the way God has made for me daily, let my thoughts be transformed by your truth, and set the hope of eternity before me even now in this life. AMEN.”

Observation

In John 15, Jesus is instructing his Disciples on the importance of abiding in him so that they may be fruitful in their mission. The metaphor of the vine and the branches and how they work together to bear fruit is something the Disciples would have understood very well because of the vast number of vineyards in the region. Jesus was making it clear to his disciples and to us as believers the importance of abiding in him, because apart from his word, the spirit's leading and our obedience, we can do nothing.

Personally, these are some of my favorite verses. They have encouraged me and have reminded me many times of the need to abide in the word. The need to be still and allow the Lord to teach me his ways. Only in Him can we gain true strength for this journey, for He alone is our source for true strength. Apart from Him, we can do nothing. The greatest thing about staying connected and abiding in the true vine is that the Lord will keep our paths straight and will lead us where we need to be. He leads us to do what we need to be doing and he will give us the words that we need to share, so that we can bear the fruit he wants to bear through us. Our daily obedience and faithfulness to abide in Christ, the true vine, will allow the Lord to use us in a mighty way. If you are a Christian, I encourage you to abide in Christ, so that you may be fruitful in your spiritual life.
